



# Social Security (Old Age Insurance)

**Theory of Change:** If older people have more income, they will be less poor; also reduces the burden on their adult children

- How it works: Sends cash to eligible older people to use as they wish; the higher their past earnings, the higher the monthly amount
  - Number of beneficiaries: 39.5 million retired workers per month in 2015
  - Total costs: about \$600 billion for the year
  - Average benefit: \$1,300/mo. in 2014 (max = \$2,600/mo)

# Impact of Social Security

**Impact:** Raised the incomes of 26 million people above the poverty line in 2014; elderly poverty rate would be 50% without SS (is now 14%)

- Overall 2014 poverty rate (SPM) = 15.3%
- Without Social Security, it would have been 23.5% for all groups

# Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC)

**Theory of Change:** Working people with children should not be taxed into poverty; an annual lump sum can be a “forced savings” plan, too

- How it works: Refunds some or all federal income taxes (and state income taxes, in 26 states) to low-income working people, mostly those w/children. For some families, they get back even more than they paid in taxes
  - Number of beneficiaries: 27 million families in 2013
  - Total costs: \$60.9 billion that year
  - Average benefit amount: \$3,074/ year or \$256/month for a family with children

# Impact of the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC)

**Impact:** With the Child Tax Credit, lifted 8.8 million people out of poverty in 2013, including more than 4.6 million children.

- 2014 poverty rate (SPM) = 15.3%
- Without the Earned Income Tax Credit, it would have been 18.4%

# Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP)

**Theory of Change:** People having money available for food not only reduces their hunger but also frees up cash for other expenses

- How it works: Provides cash-like benefits that can be spent only on groceries, to families with income up to 130% of the poverty line
  - Number of beneficiaries: 46 million individuals in December 2015
  - Total costs: \$69.6 billion last year
  - Average benefit per person: \$127/month (\$258 per household)

# Impact of SNAP


**Impact:** lifted 4.7 million people above the poverty line in 2013, including more than 2 million children [update to 2014]

- 2014 poverty rate (SPM) = 15.3%
- Without SNAP, it would have been 16.8%





# Difference in Supplemental Poverty Measure Rates: 2014




# Benefits Going to Elderly, Disabled, and Working Poor







# Largest Income Tax Expenditures in Fiscal Year 2014




# What we spent on “submerged” (top) versus direct (bottom) social programs in 2014




# Tax Expenditures are Very Costly


Tax expenditures vs. selected major program expenditures, 2014




# Shares of Selected Major Tax Expenditures, 2013




# The mortgage tax break mainly helps wealthy homeowners

Social welfare programs cut poverty in half from what it would be




Many benefits go to people who are not in poverty or low - income




